# **INTRODUCTION**

The American Symphony Orchestra (ASO) was founded in 1962 by Leopold Stokowski with the goal of providing great music for everyone. Leon Botstein expanded that focus when he joined the ASO as music director in 1992 by creating concerts that explore music through the lens of the visual arts, literature, religion, and history, as well as by reviving rarely performed works that audiences would otherwise never hear performed live. The ASO's signature programming includes its Vanguard Series, which features concerts of seldom-performed orchestral repertoire presented at Carnegie Hall, Bryant Park, and other historic venues, and its Chamber Series curated by ASO's musicians—offering concert programs dedicated to reflecting the diverse perspectives of American culture. During the summer, the ASO is the orchestra in residence at Bard's SummerScape and performs at the Bard Music Festival. All of the ASO's presentations comprise a year-round series of vital and innovative programming for audiences of all backgrounds. As part of its commitment to expanding the standard orchestral repertoire and ensuring accessibility to musical masterpieces, the ASO offers free streaming of exclusive live recordings on its digital platform, ASO Online. Content includes SummerScape operas, chamber performances, and short films. In many cases, these are the only existing recordings of some of the forgotten works that have been restored through ASO performances.

Dear Friend,

It's a very exciting time to be a part of the American Symphony Orchestra community.

When I joined Music Director Leon Botstein in 2018 to help lead the ASO, we were adhering to founder Leopold Stokowski's vision of providing "great music for everyone." Since 2020, we've expanded that mandate by bringing our concert series to many more listeners.

As a result, our signature programming, including our Vanguard Series, which features concerts of seldom-performed orchestral repertoire presented at Carnegie Hall, Bryant Park, and other historic venues, are now being presented for a wider public than Stokowski had ever imagined. And our Chamber Series, curated by ASO musicians and dedicated to the brilliant and magical diversity of American culture, has expanded to showcase performances at venues from Bryant Park to PAC NYC, reaching hundreds more New Yorkers each year with these thoughtfully crafted programs.

We also increased ASO's programming through our digital platform, ASO Online, by streaming exclusive live recordings and SummerScape operas, chamber performances, and short films—all for free.

And so today, more than 60 years after its founding, the ASO's original imperative has expanded to encompass a unique thematic programming approach, expressed by Music Director Leon Botstein's statement that "Music should be an essential part of daily life as opposed to a prohibitively expensive luxury experience." Programs range from rarely performed Strauss scores, to great jazz standards, to Afro-Cuban Batá drumming, performed by music-makers from around the world and presented at the highest level. Musician-curated presentations, now core to ASO's overall mission, have expanded access to audiences of all races, ethnicities, and classes, particularly through low-or no-cost concerts.

The wealth and richness of our artistic vision and our exponential expansion of our audiences—now 10,000 annually—have galvanized and inspired our operational growth, which resulted in the recent completion of our five-year Strategic Plan. Our leadership is comprised of a vibrant mix of dedicated professionals—international in location and background, as well as possessing a wide range of disciplines and fields, who collaborate on making the orchestra the best it can be.

I am pleased to share this update, outlining some highlights from 2023-2024, which our supporters helped to make possible. I hope this report helps you get to know us and learn about the unique and important organization that, for more than 60 years, has always innovated, adapted, and nurtured the finest musicians, and presented unknown but highly worthy musical works which, but for the ASO, would never be heard.

# ASO PROGRAMS

## **Vanguard Series**

The Vanguard Series focuses on performing underrepresented works for full orchestra in thematic programming reflecting the diverse perspectives of American culture.

#### SEPTEMBER 10, 2023 - Bryant Park SEPTEMBER 17, 2023 - Kupferberg Center for the Arts **American Expressions** - Free Admission

The ASO highlights the different forms of expression and musical languages that emerged in the 1920s, including new elements of dance, theater and jazz in this season-opening program.

## DECEMBER 14, 2023 - The Riverside Church **Judas Maccabaeus**

Set amidst the story of Hanukkah, the oratorio is a dramatization of the Jews' resistance towards their oppressors during the Maccabean revolt.

## JANUARY 24, 2024 - Carnegie Hall **Dvořák's Requiem**

Dating from the composer's late creative period, Antonín Dvořák's Requiem remains a rarity in his impressive oeuvre. It is nowhere near as well known, or as frequently performed, as the composer's late symphonies, chamber works, or other choral works.

## MARCH 22, 2024 - Carnegie Hall **Schoenberg's Gurre-Lieder**

One hundred and fifty years after the composer's birth—and more than 90 years since ASO founder Leopold Stokowski premiered the work in the U.S. with the Philadelphia Orchestra—the ASO presents Arnold Schoenberg's massive *Gurre-Lieder*.

#### SEPTEMBER 6, 2024 - Bryant Park SEPTEMBER 7, 2024 - Kupferberg Center for the Arts **Beyond the Hall**- Free Admission

The ASO explores music that draws its inspiration from outside the traditional concert setting. From dance-inspired composition (Florence Price's Suite of Dances) to the theater (Weill's *Threepenny Opera* and Bernstein's *On the Town*), and from the opera stage (Joplin's *Treemonisha*) to the silver screen (Herrmann's film score for *Psycho*, Alfred Hitchcock, 1960).

## JANUARY 24, 2025 - St. Bartholomew's Church **Bach at St. Bart's**

Long associated with the instrumental genre, Carl Phillipp Emanuel Bach is most well-known for his concertos, sonatas, and symphonies. Less well-known are his vocal compositions. The ASO performs the U.S. premiere of *Die Auferstehung und Himmelfahrt Jesu* (*The Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus*) (1774) along with his choral work *Heilig* (*Holy*).



#### MARCH 23, 2025 - David Geffen Hall, Lincoln Center Tapping into the Twenties

The ASO looks back to the influential composers who came of age during the rise of jazz, skyscrapers, and American prosperity. Including works by John Alden Carpenter, Erwin Schulhoff, William Grant Still, and Edgard Varèse, the concert featured soloist Orion Weiss on piano.

#### JUNE 6, 2025 - Carnegie Hall Strauss's Guntram

Richard Strauss's very first opera is rarely performed today—the ASO's presentation marks its first performance in New York City in this century. A riveting story of love, guilt and renunciation, *Guntram* reveals a young Strauss positioning himself as the successor to Wagner.

# ASO PROGRAMS

### **Chamber Series**

The Chamber Series began in response to COVID restrictions with programs curated by ASO musicians and taking place across multiple boroughs.





## APRIL 19, 2024 - Perelman Performing Arts Center **The Glenwood Quartet**

The Glenwood Quartet brings the spirit of the American Symphony Orchestra to this program by celebrating underperformed works by Silvestre Rivueltas and Manuel Ponce alongside a well-loved masterpiece.

## MAY 13 & 14, 2024 - Bryant Park **String Quartet**

A string quartet of ASO musicians performs works by Coleridge-Taylor Perkinson, William Grant Still, and Antonín Dvořák, in a program curated by violinist Ashley Horne, a longtime member of the American Symphony Orchestra.

## MAY 20 & 21, 2024 - Bryant Park **Woodwind Quintet**

This program features works by American composers including William Grant Still, Amy Beach, and John Philip Sousa. Curated by ASO member Gilbert Dejean, the works on the program draws inspiration from across the Americas, from folk melodies to jazz.

## MAY 12 & 14, 2025 - Bryant Park **The Music of Louis Armstrong**

The ASO Jazz Ensemble honors jazz trumpet virtuoso and innovator, Louis Armstrong, by performing a selection of the composer's lesser-recorded works, in this program curated by longtime ASO member Louis Bruno.

#### MAY 19 & 20, 2025 - Bryant Park

## Salon 1898: Cuban Dance Music at the Turn of the Twentieth Century

The first in a selection of chamber music programs that highlight the rich musical history of Cuba and its influence on American concert music and culture, from the turn of the twentieth century through today.

## **COMMUNITY IMPACT**

The ASO is dedicated to increasing access to live orchestral music for all New Yorkers through its Community Access Program.

We are committed to presenting free concerts at venues across the city, meeting communities where they are. The ASO maintains affordable admission prices to all its ticketed performances and offers at least 30% of those tickets to underserved populations through community partnerships: the ASO distributes free tickets to community organizations across New York City, including:

- Veteran Tickets Foundation
- Institute of International Education
- Disabilities Institute
- United Nations Hospitality Committee

**90%** of our audience attends concerts for free, **40%** of tickets are available for sale at \$25 or under, and **52%** are available for \$30 or under.

When a concert sells out and there is high demand for paid tickets, we remain committed to making free tickets available to our community, including our community partners.



# **DIGITAL REACH**

#### Content on ASO Online has reached a global audience of 250K+

The impact of ASO concerts has been made even greater through our free streaming library, ASO Online. The library includes live video recordings of SummerScape operas, video recordings from our live chamber performances, and short films. Each September, the ASO's mainstage concerts are livestreamed by Bryant Park, reaching audiences who otherwise cannot attend, increasing access beyond 5,000 in-person attendees.

## **Gurre-Lieder**

In September 2024 the ASO released a short film about the orchestra's massive undertaking of Arnold Schoenberg's *Gurre-Lieder*. The film takes a behind-the-scenes look at the rehearsal process leading up to the highly anticipated March 22, 2024 performance at Carnegie Hall with context provided by music director Leon Botstein and chorus director James Bagwell. The film was released in conjunction with the 150th anniversary of Schoenberg's birthday.

Since its release the short film has received 33K+ views.

## ASO MEMBERSHIP

In March 2023, the American Symphony Orchestra launched its first-ever Membership program. With its launch, the ensemble and its staff has connected with new and returning audience members, and some of whom have been attending ASO performances for decades. Through the program, which offers each member exclusive access to meet-and-greets with artists, special events such as concert receptions, complimentary tickets to various venues, priority concert seating, Friends & Family discounts, memorabilia such as autographed Playbills, and more, the organization works to further its goal to provide "great music for everyone."

Structured in three giving levels, ASO's new membership program further diversifies the orchestra's Individual Giving outreach to sustain its free and discounted presentations to expand arts access in New York City, while simultaneously welcoming audiences to get a closer look at the ASO's impact through an enhanced season-long concertgoing experience. The orchestra's membership program aims to connect patrons more closely to the ensemble, and the ensemble's musicians with audiences across NYC.
